# In Brief

# District #18 board approves budget, tax levy

Meeting lasted just 23 minutes.

The District #18 Board of Education held a public hearing early Monday morning on the proposed 2025/26 school budget and tax levy.

Superintendent Mike Brockhaus gave brief presentations regarding the creation of the proposed budget as well as tax levy.

There was just one member of the public who attended the meeting — Tom Hoefer. He questioned the amount of money in the building

Board members and Brockhaus took turns explaining how each year the school district uses money in the fund for building maintenance, doing some each year so as not to have a year when numerous projects need to be addressed.

Approved was a budget including tax asking of \$3,830,082.00 (General Fund \$3,628,062.00 and Special Building Fund \$202,020.00); and a property tax levy request of 0.355912 (General Fund 0.337139 and Building Fund 0.018773).

The meeting lasted for 23 minutes before adjourning.

HARTINGTON — An award that's been given annually since 1962 in memory of the Omaha Diocesan Council (OACCW) founder was awarded to Linda Kerkman of Elgin on Monday, September 15.

The Mullen Award was announced at the annual OACCW Convention and awarded to an active OACCW member after being nominated and then selected. This is given to a woman who is outstanding in her service to family and community, active in "Council" at the archdiocesan, deanery and parish levels; and involved in civic affairs, educational groups and groups of other

Linda's service included being a Lector, EHMC, Sacristan as well as officers at Archdiocesan and deanery levels and attending several National Council of Catholic Women conventions. She has been on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. She also supports seminarians spiritually and financially. Other active areas include:

 Volunteering at Orphan Grain Train and has unwittingly mentored many of her fellow sisters in Christ,

encouraging them to leadership, service and spirituality, leading OACCW spiritually for several years.

• Made numerous presentations at retreats, workshops and conferences. She is a great story-teller.

· Has served as the OACCW Pre-Convention Gathering Toastmistress.

Kerkman herself initially believed God was calling her to be a nun and in the journey of discernment, then realized she could better serve God by becoming a nurse, wife and mother - which she did. With her husband LeRoy they raised four children.

She is also an Oblate of the Benedictine Monastery in Norfolk.

One of her projects was making children's chasubles and habits as a way to plant a seed of openness to a life in a religious vocation. She's made blankets for the Christ Child Society, an organization which Mrs. Mullen served as President twice; and Linda has made more than 1200 diapers out of T-shirts for missions. One of her biggest contributions to her community and so many others is the fruition of a vision she had.

She spent hours rehabbing a vacant business into a non-profit thrift store: The Bargain Box in Elgin which has become a well-known destination. After several years, she turned over the leadership of this store and with the help of many volunteers, the Bargain Box has been able to donate almost \$800,000 in monetary donations to many near and far organizations and medical causes .... and all she was envisioning was enough money for diaper postage.

For her faithful dedication and on behalf of OACCW, Theresa Pavlik presented her with an Our Lady of Good Counsel medal after it was blessed by the new Omaha Archdiocese Bishop Michael McGovern. In attendance for this honor were the Archbishop OACCW Spiritual Advisor Fr. Ross Burkhalter, daughter Julie Saathoff, son Jeremy and wife Jamie Kerkman, several priests, and OACCW officers, members and guests.

When Linda spoke to the group after receiving her award, she was quick to

She will be competing in the State Range Contest this week, being held in Keya Paha County.



# Looking Back Elgin Review

### **Sixty Years Ago**

September 23, 1965

Thieves and vandals were busy in Elgin Saturday night damaging property and stealing keys from parked cars. Thieves, or local pranksters, slipped the keys out of all of Contois Motor Company's used and new cars. Nothing else appeared to be stolen from the cars. Two front tires on the Floyd Kallhoff auto were slashed the same night and new tires had to be purchased.

Miss Dianne Wagner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Wagner of Elgin and Lemoyne Ahlers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emil Ahlers of Clearwater, were married Saturday, Sept. 18, 1965 at St. Francis Catholic Church in Neligh. After a short wedding trip, the couple will live on a farm near Clarkson.

Temperatures here dropped to a low of 38 degrees last Thursday night and Friday night when the mercury was to skid down to the frost or freezing mark the sky stayed cloudy and more rain fell. A total of 27.37 inches of moisture has been measured in the bank's rain gauge so-far this year.

# Responsible government spending

Federal spending and our growing national debt are serious challenges which must be addressed for the long-term fiscal health of our nation. By enacting our tax cut and family security package (H.R. 1) in July, Republicans took significant strides to eliminate waste, fraud, and abuse in federal programs such as Medicaid and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. The appropriations process provides another important opportunity to ensure taxpayer dollars are spent responsibly.

With the end of the fiscal year rapidly approaching, this week I voted for a clean continuing resolution to fund the government and ensure the Trump administration can continue confronting our nation's greatest challenges while we continue working to reach a fiscally responsible agreement on funding federal agencies for the coming year.

Rather than produce responsible spending bills, Democrats in the House and Senate have demanded we attach unrelated policies to a continuing resolution thereby expanding irresponsible healthcare spending. In H.R. 1, Republicans took action to address high rates of Medicaid payment errors, eliminated a Biden-era nursing home staffing rule which burdened 90 percent of facilities in Nebraska with risk of closure, and delivered the largest ever single investment in rural healthcare through the Rural Health Transformation Fund, of which the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services launched implementation this week. rural healthcare workforce develop

ment, improve sustainability for rural health providers, and promote innovation to improve health outcomes. As H.R. 1 will save an estimated \$911 billion over a decade in improper and misguided Medicaid spending, the Rural Health Transformation Fund will provide meaningful support to sustain rural healthcare providers at a cost of just \$10 billion annually for five years.

Biden administration initiatives passed with only Democrat votes in Congress eliminated income caps on premium tax credit (PTC) eligibility and expanded Obamacare subsidies. Unfortunately, this opened the door to massive fraud and subsidization of premiums for high-income earners.

The Government Accountability Office, Congressional Budget Office, and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services have confirmed 6.4 million individuals are improperly enrolled in Obamacare plans, costing taxpayers \$27 billion. Compounding matters. 100 percent of premium subsidies combined with little to no oversight or accountability opened the door to people fraudulently being enrolled in Affordable Care Act (ACA) plans with out even knowing about it. In 2024, 12 million Obamacare enrollees submitted no medical claims in 2024. This is up from 3.5 million before the expansion took effect.

To end waste, fraud, and abuse, H.R. 1 required those with ACA premium subsidies to annually verify income and other qualifying information and eliminated tax credit eligibility for illegal immigrants. Sadly, Democrats are demanding the repeal of these reforms

# Lagging job growth in Omaha and Lincoln sparks concern

Editor's note: Opinions expressed here are those of the author and do not necessarily reflect those of The Elgin Review.

Alarm bells are sounding over the lack of robust job growth in the state's two largest cities.

A recent study commissioned by the Omaha-based Aksarben Foundation indicated that job growth in Omaha and Lincoln lagged behind its peer cities, such as Sioux Falls, Des Moines and Oklahoma City.

An analysis by old buddy Henry Cordes in the Omaha World-Herald found that the number of jobs in Nebraska's top cities grew by 0.3% and

0.4%, respectively, from 2020-24. That's quite a bit less than the 1.8% job growth in Sioux Falls and the 1.2% growth in Des Moines.

The Aksarben report calculated that had Omaha and Lincoln seen employment grow at the same rate as its peers, the two cities would have added 68,000 more jobs and generated

up to \$800 million in additional state

With 60% of the state's jobs and wages based in those two cities, that's pretty stunning stuff.

Why Omaha and Lincoln are being lapped by its competitors was unclear. Job growth nationally has lagged in recent months, but others are doing better.

The report offered several sugges-

- Brain Drain. Nebraska in recent years has seen more people with bachelor's degrees and higher leaving the state than moving here. In 2020, the net loss was 4,610 individuals, according to a report by the University of Nebraska at Omaha Center for Public Affairs

Brain drain, the report suggested, makes companies look elsewhere to

Why the brain drain? I'd say it's a lack of high-paying jobs college grads want, and the age-old lure of "bright lights, big cities" being more exciting



than the Cornhusker State.

– High Taxes. Omaha business leaders, who make up the Aksarben Foundation, blamed the state's high property taxes and relatively high income taxes for some of the sluggish job growth.

They also called for more incentives for businesses (don't we already give millions and millions?).

But Des Moines taxes are higher, the World-Herald article pointed out, so why was its job growth so much better?

– Promotion. I saw recently that the tate tourism director who adonted the pitch line, "Honestly, Nebraska: it's not for everyone," resigned. That motto brought some attention to the state, but at-a-crawl traffic on a recent visit to

I thought it also gave some people one more reason not to visit or live here. Overall, we Nebraskans are a pretty humble bunch.

We're not braggers like those bighats in Texas, and we don't celebrate our cheese and beer like those in Wisconsin and Minnesota.

But I do think we have some work to do to promote our "Good Life" state and talk up its advantages. That probably means spending more money for promotion.

We have great public schools, low rime and ample open spaces. (I really appreciate the latter attribute after battling bumper-to-bumper, movingscenic Colorado. Somehow, I didn't see beauty in the back end of the car ahead of me.)

We have a tremendous work ethic, a strong bond with our neighborhoods and communities, and a low cost of living. And the best volleyball in the land, along with a getting better football team.

It's a tough environment for companies right now. There's uncertainty about raw materials due to tariffs, and the shortage of workers is being exacerbated, to some extent, by the crackdown on immigrants

But we have many attributes that ought to be attractive to job growth. We've got some work to do.

# Ag market program helps food systems grow

Farmers markets are in full swing this summer, bringing fresh food to communities. These markets, along with food hubs and other local food businesses, play an important role in rural economies. However. connecting with new consumers isn't always easy for producers. The Local Agriculture Market Program (LAMP) can help

Administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), LAMP was created in the 2018 farm bill to strengthen local and regional food systems. It combines several USDA programs that help farmers and food businesses grow their operations and reach new markets. These include the Farmers Market and Local Food Promotion Program (FMLFPP) and the Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) Program.

FMLFPP includes two sub-programs. The Farmers Market Promotion Program helps start and improve direct-to-consumer outlets like farmers markets, community supported agriculture, and roadside stands. The Local Food Promotion Program supports food hubs, distributors, and other businesses that move locally produced food from farms to  $\,$ buyers such as schools, grocery stores, and restaurants. For both programs, grant funds are awarded to organizations who then provide education and technical assistance to producers and food businesses. VAPG helps agricultural producers expand their businesses through value-added products and services by awarding grants directly to farmers and ranchers. Funding can be used to generate new products and create or expand marketing opportunities

that help producers generate additional income. Programs like LAMP are key to building a food system that works for farmers and consumers alike. Over time, these projects increase income for small and mid-sized farms, improve access to healthy food, and support job growth in rural areas. As markets grow and communities look for more local food options, continued congressional investment in programs like LAMP will remain essential.

# Controlled burn permits subject of NRC interim hearing

This past week, the Natural Resources Committee held an interim hearing to review the current laws that relate to the approval process, personnel involved, and costs associated with controlled burn permits. Controlled burns are planned fires intentionally set to manage ecosystems or prevent future larger, uncontrolled wildfires. These planned burns help reduce hazardous fuels

like dead vegetation, promote the growth of native species, and help control problematic species like the eastern redcedar tree which can impede livestock and native wildlife.

cording to testimony presented by an expert from the University of Nebraska, the control of invasive species, primarily the eastern redcedar tree, is the number one reason why landowners carry out burns because such species cause losses in usable rangeland. For example,

from 2019 to 2024, Nebraska lost between 218,000 to 419,000 tons of forage annually due to woody encroachment primarily due

to the growth and spread of the eastern redcedar in rangeland areas. The scale of this problem has led to 17 landowner burn

associations needing to be established in this state in order

# Huskers, Crawford and a plaque

LINCOLN — So much for breaking the streak.

No, I'm not talking about the fastest thing on two feet, the guy who's so proud of his anatomy he wants to give us a peak. Ray Stevens penned quite the song back in the early 70s when streaking became a popular fad on college campuses. It continues today as, every now and then, someone jumps out of a crowd at a professional football game and runs around the field until security makes like Dick Butkus and plants that person on the ground only to be taken to the paddy wagon and off to

The streak I'm talking about was the 27-game losing streak to Top 25-rated college football teams. It's now 28.

It continued Saturday afternoon when Michigan beat the Huskers 30 to 27 at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln. The game wasn't as close as the final score indicated.

What began in 2016 goes on. Surely it will end this season

As far as T-shirts go, I'd rather have one of the Terrence 'Bud' Crawford shirts with the Nebraska logo on it.

Crawford lit up the world on Saturday night, September 13 when he won a unanimous decision over Canelo Alvarez.

As fight fans go, I like professional boxing but very few fighters create the buzz like they did in the 70s when Muhammad Ali, Joe Frazier, George Foreman and Ken Norton dominated the ring. After them came Thomas Hearns, Sugar Ray Leonard, Roberto Duran and later on to Mike Tyson, Floyd Mayweather

When those guys had fights I made time to watch them, if not live then a week or two later on ABC's Wide World of Sports (the show about the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat). Howard Cosell's verbage still rings in my ears - "Down Goes Frazier, Down Goes Frazier." I still use the line with a slight modification here in the office or at a ball game when the time is right.

Right now, Crawford is the gold standard for all other fighters to be measured. Holding four championship belts, his record is 42-0.

What made his fight against Canelo so special was that Crawford went up two weight classes to box the Mexican

Canelo had power, Crawford nearly equaled his power, but fought a much smarter fight.

He's put Omaha, Nebraska on the map for all the world to see, in much the same way Ali did for Louisville, Kentucky when he became 'The Greatest.'

And, even more impressive, he hasn't been trapped by the pitfalls of fame as so many other great fighters did in their prime.

Having said all that, I hope Crawford has made enough money that he can retire soon. I don't want him to stay in the ring one minute past the end of his prime.

There was nothing more distasteful than to see ALI when he was no longer the greatest. When boxers, in their prime, like when Larry Holmes beat an Ali who was a mere shell of himself at the end of his career. It's kind of the same

to pool resources and knowledge to carry out controlled burns. Overall, a controlled burn is incredibly safe. According to one study cited at the hearing, approximately 99% of landowner burn association-led initiated fires occur without incidence. Furthermore, if these burns do escape to become wildfires, the damages and suppression costs are typically lower than wildfires that start due to other ignition sources, such as lightning.

However, a controlled burn is not entirely risk-free either. One just needs to look at the case of the Plum Creek Fire near Johnstown in Brown County that occurred earlier in April of this year. This wildfire began after a burn held by a landowner, in coordination with the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, local fire departments, and other partners, escaped containment. The initial burn was carried out amid dry conditions near an area where a red flag warning had been issued for the day, meaning there was a high fire danger. The result was a week-long effort to control the 7,000-acre fire which resulted in more than 45 cattle being lost, and the destruction of one cabin (a secondary residence) and at least

Throughout the hearing, there was broad consensus that fire remains a necessary tool for landowners to manage land and vegetation. However, testifiers indicated that the Legislature should consider further strengthening the powers of local fire chiefs to shut down more types of burning during extreme conditions, such as during the times when a red flag warning is issued. Other recommendations include encouraging landowners to have a written burn plan prior to carrying out acreage burns, improving the current generic burn permit application to allow for more specific information to be provided, and increasing fines or post-fire accountability. I would anticipate legislation next year that seeks to implement one or more of these recommendations that were discussed for possible consideration at the hearing.

# **Controlling late summer weeds**

Late summer always seems like a time when weeds can be-

come quite noticeable in pastures. While they may be an eye sore, control methods now are limited. Proper ID can help with making the right management call.

Annual weeds like horseweed, sunflowers, snow-on-themountain, and buffalo bur can be plentiful. often showing up in areas of pastures that have relatively thin grass stands, in areas where animals congregate, or if some overgrazing has occurred. These weeds are taking advantage

of an open space, providing the sunlight, nutrients, and water to grow. Besides being too large to kill at this point, most annuals have already set seed. Spraying at this point will do nothing to prevent that seed from maturing and starting a new plant next year.

To control the population of annual weeds next year, preventing seed spread is key. At this point the only sure fire tool available is to collect it by hand, a very labor intensive option. Plants that have yet to set seed may be moved off to improve appearance and stop some seed production. We can also mark the spot as an area to keep an eye on next year. A spring herbicide application when plants are smaller is better for summer annual control and killing plants well ahead of seed set.

Another group of annuals we may run into later on, are winter annuals. These plants sprout in the fall, over winter and initiate growth in the spring. Species like henbit, downy brome, and mustard are best controlled later this fall in the rosette stage. If a pre-emergent option is available for the species you want to control, make sure to look at the length of residual and time your application to provide protection through the entire fall growing

period. Pulling the trigger too soon could leave a window of opportunity for growth before our first hard freeze. Again, marking these locations to come back in early spring and check for any break through plants will provide more complete con-

Perennial weeds like western ragweed, ironweed, and verbena are still noticeable but require different control. Once again, spraying weeds now

does little good. Weeds are too large to kill and herbicides may only slightly reduce some seed production. Just like annuals, spring herbicide applications are best when plants are small and young tissues more easily absorb the chemical. However, if additional control is needed, waiting closer to a killing frost is best. This provides the double whammy of stressing the plant heading into winter and allows more product to be translocated down to the shoots and roots as nutrients are pulled down for winter storage.

For all weeds, dry conditions can throw a wrench in our plans as well. Plants that have gone dormant due to drought are not absorbing and translocating herbicide like normal, so little control will come from an application. It's better to hold off until moisture renews growth either this fall or next

When it comes to herbicides, getting a proper ID is critical for making the correct management decision. If you need a hand, UNL produces two handy plant ID books available in pdf form free online; "Common Grasses of Nebraska" and "Common Forbs and Shrubs of Nebraska". As always, your

local extension office is also willing to lend a hand.

The last point to consider for pasture weeds, but arguably most important, is focusing on the grazing management for long-term weed control. This includes using the proper stocking rate and developing a good rotational grazing plan. While this doesn't work for all weeds, especially some of our more nasty perennial species like leafy spurge and Canada thistle, most reoccurring pasture weeds are a symptom of poor grazing management. These plants are opportunistic invaders, taking advantage of an open piece of ground and weakened competition from their neighbors. As such, an important objective is to increase the health, vigor, and density of your grass. Healthy, competitive grass stands are essential to reduce weed populations economically over time.

Pasture weeds may look unsightly now, but hold off on spraying. Improve grazing management and time herbicides for the best window of control so herbicides won't be needed as often in the future.


