

Superintendent accepts offer for two more years

Meeting last week, the District #18 Board of Education approved a twoyear contract extension for Superintendent Mike Brockhaus.

The board approved a two-year contract which calls for the superintendent to be paid a salary of \$122,293.71 for the 2024/2025 school year. The salary will then rise to just over \$125,000 for the 2025/2026 school year.

The contract was approved on a 4-1 vote with board member Luke Hinkle absent. Casting the lone dissenting vote was board member Ron Bode. That was just one of two main issues

involving payroll. Just moments earlier, the board on a 5-0 voted to approve the teacher's negotiated agreement for 2024/25 and 2025/26. The agreement is negotiated every two years, the same as the superintendent's contract.

Later in the meeting, for the first time in a number of years, School District #18 will not accept any applications for early retirement incentive to eligible teachers.

School board member Eric Beckman said he was concerned about how, if such a package was offered and accepted, it could prove costly if they were forced to hire a teacher which, due to the teachers pay scale, would be eligible for a higher salary.

Since implementation of the mechanism to offer early retirement, the school has offered two applications in recent years.

No motion was made, the board simply chose not to make a motion to accept applications. The matter is discussed and possible action taken every December.

In other action:

New teacher — Ahlona Landauer was hired as a new teacher for the 2024/25 school year. Superintendent Mike Brockhaus said Landauer will teach Spanish as well as lend her expertise on technology issues. She could also assist with language arts, he

Trips — In separate motions, the board approved the annual trip for juniors to Washington, D.C. and New York City in the Spring of 2024. A separate motion was approved to provide transportation for Music Boosters to attend a performance of 'The Lion King' at the Orpheum Theater in Oma-

Dusty driveway — Brockhaus informed the board about the possibility of applying soybean oil on the football field driveway as a means to control dust issues.

Wiz and drone team wow Huskers in Memorial Stadium

Editor's Note - Though the powerhouse Husker volleyball team ended number two in the Nation Sunday, the season wowed fans beginning with the record-breaking Volleyball Day in Nebraska August 30th. Our winning Wolfpack volleyball team attended that day as did a feature writer for The Elgin Review. She had opportunity to get behind the breathtaking drone show and posts this story.

Eyes affixed on the night sky. Momentary awestruck silence. Then totally mesmerized by the Nebraska outline, moving volleyball, rotating N, and the number 92,003. Prolonged, uproarious cheers. Then curiosity. What was that?

It was a drone show -- 160 drones to be exact, carefully orchestrated by Nebraska's own Don "Wiz" Wisnieski and his skilled team.

Conversations continue to abound amongst those who experienced the drone show northeast of Memorial Stadium on Volleyball Day in Nebraska, August 30, 2023. Many had never seen

an aerial display like this and definite-

ly not one of this grandeur.

Wisnieski started the Fantasy Drone Shows business in 2022 as a complement to the fireworks shows he's been doing for 15-plus years as a sales rep for J&M Displays out of Yarmouth, IA. This includes being involved with fireworks at football games in Memorial Stadium for more than 10 years and the Big Bang Boom July 4th show in Norfolk for decades.

"When I first learned about Volleyball Day in Nebraska, I wanted to be part of this history-making event," he said and began 'courting" the university by sending a three-dimensional video rendering of what could be done.

"We heard back from the university (athletic) team that they were told to 'make it happen,'" Wisnieski explained. He assumed the green light came from either Husker Volleyball Coach John Cook or Vice Chancellor for Athletics Trev Alberts.

The rest is history, and history it was - the first drone show to accompany a fireworks display in Memorial Stadium. "We got to be part of a world record," Wisnieski said gleaming with pride. "This is a fan experience like

no other, the next generation of aerial entertainment."

While the crowd all got goosebumps, Wisnieski did, too. "It's hard to explain it. That feeling when you walk into the stadium," he said recounting his days as a child growing up on a farm near Dodge, NE when he and his family listened to every Husker football game

on the radio.

While a diehard Husker, Wisnieski's post-secondary education in building construction came from Northeast Community College. He started a construction business in 1986 that continues in operation. Over the years, he


The tree was entered in the Antelope County Extension's Festival of Trees at the Ag building in Riverside Park- Nel-





Looking Back Elgin Review

Sixty Years Ago

December 19, 1963

The Union Oil Company has erected an 18,000-gallon propane gas bulk plant one mile north of town which will serve this area of Antelope county. Winter weather has delayed completion of the work, although the facilities have been in use around three weeks. When completed the tank will be painted white and the area fenced and graveled. Considerable work remains to be done on the building. Kenneth Welding is the driver of the company's bulk truck.

Although St. Boniface was out-scored in the last half, their ten-point half-time lead, accurate shooting and a tight defense gave them a five-point, 60-55, victory over Norfolk Burns, a Class C team. Coach Gary Schmidt's undefeated squad fared well at the free-throw line for a 66 percent average. Pressure in the last minute of play could have caused the S. B. Knights to falter at the charity line, cutting down their victory margin.

Leonard Iburg copped 29 points to help the Elgin High Eagles



No more work from home? Is hybrid the answer going forward

Remember the Christmas bonus? Probably a thing of past given the changed face of the workplace. Perhaps your "bonus" allows you to work from home.

Be grateful the next time you slide in behind your computer, in your jammies at some odd hour to complete a project. It seems that even the work from home mentality is changing in favor of the hybrid work week - two or three days in the office and two or three days working remotely.

The latest figures from the University of Nebraska at Omaha's Center for Public Affairs Research (CPAR), revealed only about 8% of Nebraska workers remained in remote operations in the first two months of 2021; a

significant drop from a high of 16% in May 2020. Those figures are thought to still apply to 2023. Driven by the

Covid 19 panic, and necessity, it seemed like remote work was the answer. But workers are obviously heading back to the office. I'm not crazy about that

- I remember many a nonproductive workday as office gossip and politics ruled. But the numbers don't lie.

Since I retired from my third encore career nine years ago, I haven't given much thought to work, let alone where I do what work I accomplish.

But I sympathize with the State of Nebraska employees who are bristling at a draconian order from Governor Jim Pillen that the entire state work force return to the office full time starting in January. No data, no rationale, he just thinks people do better face-to-face and that people shouldn't work from home. I support their union's efforts to open bargain-



ing on this change in policy. It should be spelled out specifically in a new labor contract that considers what is for some a drastic change in lifestyle. Remember, some of the state agencies have remote work policies that are decades old, yes, older than Covid.

The Nebraska Association of Public Employees initially sent Pillen's chief negotiator a demand to bargain over the return-to-office mandate, but the state dismissed that demand. The union is emphatic the order — which

will broadly end remote and hybrid work for more than 2,800 state employees — will bring "wholesale changes to both the status quo and the terms and conditions of employment" and are therefore subject to mandatory bargaining.

It has been reported that nearly 1,400 respondents to a survey said they were considering leaving state government over the order, including 593 state employees who said they have already started looking for or have already

applied for new jobs. More than 87% of state employees who said they are considering leaving the state's public workforce said they would stay if Pillen rescinded the order.

This will hurt us all, especially the most vulnerable Nebraskans who rely on critical state services," said union president Justin Hubly.

Pillen says only that he does not believe in working from home.

But the national mood is changing, and the results of polls being reported

Answering Iranian aggression On October 7th, Hamas launched a

massive terror attack against Israel. They murdered at least 33 Americans and 1,200 Israelis. The horrific, ruthless, and barbaric attack couldn't have happened without the assistance of Iran. Iran gave

weapons, training, and funding to Hamas. According to The Wall Street Journal, Iranian officials helped plan the attack itself and "gave the green light" in a meeting in Beirut, Lebanon.

Iran's aggression isn't only targeted at Israel. Since the October 7th terror attack on Israel, Iran has

also attacked the U.S. through its proxies at least 90 times. These increasingly frequent attacks demand a strong response. President Biden must change his weak appeasement-first policies or American lives will remain at risk. Iran needs to know it can't antagonize us without consequences.

Iran is the world's largest state sponsor of terrorism. It has a network of terrorist groups it supports, like Hamas. This network includes Palestinian Islamic Jihad in Gaza, Hezbollah in Lebanon, the Houthis in Yemen, and several other groups in Iraq and Syria. The Houthis have escalated their attacks on Israeli and American-owned vessels in the Red Sea. Their goal is to disrupt global shipping lanes. Despite this aggression and dozens of Americans injured, we've seen a very limited retaliatory response. President Biden has authorized only a few airstrikes.

This appearement-first foreign policy from the Biden administration is endangering Americans around the world. In his first weeks in office, Biden removed the Houthis from the list of terrorist organizations. He announced hundreds of millions of dollars in aid to United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA). UNRWA has been described as "a branch of Hamas." This weakness only invites more aggression from adversaries like

If that's not had enough the Biden administration issued a sanctions waiver providing Iran access to approximately \$10 billion. It has also refused to permanently freeze another \$6 billion in cash. On top of that, President Biden had already allowed Iran to profit an estimated \$80 billion from oil sales. All of this was done in the naïve hope that Iran would play nice. It was reckless, foolish, and it allows Iran to fund terrorism.

America should not appease the demands of terrorists. America should destroy terrorists. Iran needs to know that we will not stand idle while they enable and encourage their proxies to attack American personnel or our allies. That's why I support the Standing Against Houthi Aggression Act to force the president to re-designate the Houthis as a Foreign Terrorist Organization. I also support legislation to block Iran's access to the billions of dollars the Biden administration released earlier this year. I've backed the Revoke Iranian Funding Act to direct the Treasury Secretary to pursue increased sanctions against Iranian assets. We must not appease Hamas and we must not appease Iran.

has had successful insulation, cemetery care, curb grinding, and concrete businesses. At age 60, he reported being "tired of pouring concrete and blowing insulation. The drone business is fun. I enjoy the heck out of it.'

As with any business, you have to crawl before you walk, he said explaining how his three quarter million-dollar investment in drones and ground station equipment was a start. His dream is to own 1,200 drones running six crews with a show at the Superbowl.

Right now, working off the mantra of 'surround yourself with the best people you can find', he's thrilled with the core crew. They include his wife, Jolene, office manager; Brian Anderson, director of operations; Scott Buss, lead designer, and Ben Uzzell, drone services coordinator.

The team was in full force east of Norfolk on a moonlit September evening for a test run of another show, this one in Philadelphia's Lincoln Financial Field for a professional association. The same test run for the Volleyball Day show occurred here before going to Lincoln on August 13 to check position, height, the effect of ambient light, and visibility throughout the stadium.

On the front lawn of the Wisnieski home east of Norfolk, one could better understand the set-up on the practice field northeast of the stadium on Volleyball Day. One hundred sixty drones are evenly spaced

on a 48 x 44-foot grid. Other configurations are possible though this is the most common. A control center on a folding table nearby sends GPS signals to the machines.

Anderson, a stickler on U.S. Federal Aeronautics Administration (FAA) rules, puts the drones in hover mode to be sure all are working correctly. (All crew carry a drone operator license). "Each drone knows the job they're supposed to do," Anderson quipped. "Some have names, and we hope to name them all.'

Then the American flag, an eagle, and more illuminate the night sky. Each show runs about 10 minutes and is programmed by Buss. For Volleyball Day it took about a week of long hours to pull the show together. "I even bought a volleyball so I could design all the seams right," he said. Numbers, such as the 92,003 that ended the show, are easier to program, which he did on the spot with some tweaks to make them easily visible.

These show drones move at a speed of six meters (nearly 20 feet) per second and require compass recalibration on occasion, Anderson said. Height is 400 feet.

Three hours before show time, the crew and helpers position the drones, set up the ground station, and use hotspots for internet connection. On a site visit to Lincoln. Anderson said detailed atten-

As a farm wife, she spent



Silage feed-out examined

Silage harvested this year has had time to fully ferment and producers may be in the process of feeding off of a pile. Most of us are very aware of the importance of proper management during harvest for a quality feedstuff. However, the situation can be quite different when the silo is open and fed

Once packed and fermentation completed untouched silage can be preserved for a long time. However, that state of long-term preservation changes as soon as we start feeding. Once the silage is exposed to oxygen, aerobic fermentation starts to take place and the material starts to deteriorate. As I heard it put recently, A" silage pile is like we raked together a big pile of leaves. We use fermentation magic to keep it stable, but when it is exposed to air, we turn our silage pile into a compost pile and it starts to decompose." For this reason, it is recommended to minimize the silage face's exposure to the

air. Easier said than done.

As we pull silage from the pile to feed, a well packed silage reduces the ability for oxygen to penetrate from the exposed face. Removing a small amount equally across the face daily is another good practice that reduces the duration of time silage is exposed to air and can help limit mold growth and decomposition. A good rule of thumb is to remove 6 to 8 inches daily across the entire face.

Minimum removal should be 4 inches daily in the summer and 3 inches in the winter.

Pile size is critical to managing removal properly. While it's a bit too late to change things this year, next year we can estimate how much we need to feed daily and try to adjust pile proportions to better fit daily removal. The University of Wisconsin recommends using a face removal rate of 12 inches per day when planning silage

For instance, extracting silage from the silo pit, with a payloader results in a vastly different open face when the payloader is used going into the face from the front than when it is operated from side to side of the face "shaving" its surface. Again this is all about oxygen management. A smooth face has less surface area for oxygen to interact with and begin decomposition than a ragged one, especially if removing feed

roughly opens up larger cracks deeper into the silage pile.

A final and especially important consideration is worker safety when working with the vertical face of a silage pile or pit. While they may seem stable, collapse can happen at any moment and without warning. This is particularly important when working in silo bunkers of large sizes, and heights.

How we feed silage can be just as important in maintain quality as putting it up. In summary, remove the amount of silage that is going to be used, using the technique or gear that leaves the smoothest face and expose the smallest surface possible. Most importantly, be overly cautious when working close to the silo open face.



OCIA International, headquartered in Lincoln, is one of the world's oldest, largest,





tion was paid to safety and risk. FAA restricts drone flights over people and moving traffic. FAA compliance also requires air space authorization, otherwise known as NOTAM (notice to air missions). 
