# Ewing man sentenced to 4-5 years in prison

Ryan Brummels, 23, of Ewing appeared in front of the Honorable James Kube in the Antelope County district courtroom in Neligh last Friday, Jan. 19, to be sentenced for first-degree sexual assault of a minor, a Class 2 felony committed Dec. 26, 2022.

After reviewing a report provided by the Nebraska probation office and school records submitted by the defendant, Kube found Brummels was not a

suitable candidate for probation, indicating a sentence lesser than incarceration would depreciate the seriousness of the offense and promote disrespect for the law. He then sentenced Brummels, who is represented by Frederick Bartell of Norfolk, to not less than four nor more than five years in an institution under the jurisdiction of the Nebraska Department of Corrections.

A Class II felony carries the potential for up to 50 years imprisonment.

Brummels was ordered to pay court costs in the amount of \$379.43 and was

advised of the requirements of the Nebraska Sex Offender Registration Act, which the Brummels acknowledged. In a plea agreement between Brummels and Antelope County prosecutor Joe Smith last October, both parties agreed to a stipulated 25-year registration obligation. Brummels was remanded to the custody of Antelope County Sheriff Bob Moore for execution of sentence.

Smith filed the charge, along with a motion for an arrest warrant, Feb. 2, 2023, following an investigation by an Antelope County deputy.

# **Rural Elgin** woman found dead in home

Autopsy performed to determine cause of death of Debra Grothe, 64

Multiple law enforcement agencies were called to a rural home Wednesday afternoon, January 17, to conduct an investigation into the death of Debra Grothe, age 64.

The Wheeler County Sheriff's office, along with the Nebraska State Patrol, headed up the investigation.

Wheeler County Attorney Joe McNally said at approximately 12:45 hours, the Wheeler County Sheriff's Office was notified of a death that occurred in rural Elgin at 50859 Hwy 70.

McNally said, to aid in the determination of the circumstances of the death, a search

warrant was obtained and executed with the assistance of the Nebraska State Patrol, Antelope County Sheriff's Office and the Greeley County Sheriff's Office

'Farmer leadership is crucial to NSB and submitting a candidacy petition is a powerful way for farmers to actively shape the future of our soybean industry," said Andy Chvatal, NSB executive director. en national security for the United States and our allies, they have serious implications for economic security around the world

This was clearly evidenced on a recent trip I made with many of my colleagues to Eagle Pass, TX, on our southern border. What I witnessed there was devastating. State and local agencies are being overwhelmed in an entirely preventable crisis. Despite the trafficking of minors, the unchecked flow of fentanyl, and loss of life. the administration insists the

border is secure. Early in 2023, the House passed H.R. 2, a bill to address security risks on the border. President Biden must stop ignoring this problem and work with Congress to enact real solutions.

As Vladimir Putin continues his aggression in Ukraine, tensions in Europe have risen. In other parts of the world, escalation by China against Taiwan and the enemies of Israel must also be taken seriously as Israeli forces continue to confront the threat of Hamas and seek release of hostages taken on October 7, 2023.

This week, U.S. and U.K. forces have conducted strikes in defense of commercial shipping vessels in the Red Sea which have been suffering attacks from Iran-backed Houthi rebels from Yemen claiming the attacks as a show of support for Hamas. In fact, many of the ships targeted by the Houthis have not been linked to Israel, and this terror has severely impacted trade in the region. To deter greater escalation and secure trade routes, the best recourse for the U.S. and our allies is to respond decisively. Regional stability will not be achieved by capitulation to terrorists.

As Taiwan conducts a critical presidential election, China has continued to exert pressure on the vulnerable democracy. This week, Beijing officials have signaled a more antagonistic posture regarding trade with Taiwan and launched a satellite through Taiwanese air space, triggering a warning to the public of a possible air raid.

Considering the urgency of these challenges, I have serious concerns about the Biden administration's track record on national security issues. The administration showed weakness in its disastrous withdrawal from Afghanistan, and 13 Americans needlessly lost their lives. The administration's refusal to appropriately address border vulnerabilities, its slowness to respond to a surveillance balloon from China over our homeland, and the

unacceptable and dangerous breakdown of communication in our defense chain of command have all put Americans at risk.

Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin has recently been released from the hospital, and I wish him a full recovery. However, the fact no one in the White House – and very few in the Pentagon – knew of his hospitalization or recent diagnosis is inexcusable. This week, I joined many of my colleagues in sending a letter to the Department of Defense demanding these concerns be addressed.

I am also fully supportive of the House Armed Services Committee's announcement of a formal inquiry into the secretary's failure to disclose his hospitalization and incapacitation.

Furthermore, Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas is failing in his responsibility to respond to the humanitarian tragedy and national security crisis at our southern border. As state and local authorities scramble to respond to the overwhelming number of illegal immigrants crossing into our country, some have resorted to using schools and government facilities to house immigrants.

It is crucial we have leaders who immediately and decisively respond to threats to our country and the safety of American citizens. Insisting on competence and accountability for those responsible for our national security is a duty I take seriously. I will never stop fighting to keep Americans safe and promote American interests through a safer world.

# Agreement reached in five-year-old case involving Omaha man

Jeffrey A. Reinke, 35, of Omaha faced the Honorable Donna Taylor on Jan. 17, in the Antelope County courtroom in Neligh, in a five-year-old case. He was charged with Count I, leave accident, fail to furnish information, a Class 2 misdemeanor, and Count II, no operator's license, a Class 3 misdemeanor.

Reinke's attorney, Gregory Pivovar of Bellevue, had filed a motion to dismiss or discharge, on Jan. 14. He indicated, in the motion, that neither the complaint filed Feb. 26, 2018, nor

a warrant issued in May 2018, were ever served on his client. In the motion, the attorney claimed Reinke had never been served the complaint nor the original warrant issued in 2018 and that he had lived with a roommate, who was the owner of the vehicle, at the address listed on the registration.

A plea deal was discussed. County Attorney Joe Smith agreed to dismiss Count I upon Reinke's payment of restitution and he will be allowed to handle Count II by waiver.

Reinke's case stems from allegations he failed to report a 2018 New Year's Day accident. Reinke, allegedly driving an uninsured vehicle belonging

to another Omaha individual, crashed the vehicle at the intersection of highways 20 and 13 east of Brunswick, causing damage to signs and then abandoned the damaged vehicle. In addition, his driver's license was allegedly suspended out of Washington state. The warrant was issued after he failed to appear in court. The warrant expired and was re-issued in May 2023, and was served Oct. 18, 2023, at the Law Enforcement Center in Neligh.

Austin L. McCullough, 31, and Jolene L. Miller, 32, both of Hudson, Wisconsin, were set for arraignment and trials on infraction counts of possession

of marijuana and drug paraphernalia, alleged Dec. 12.

McCullough paid his fines \$300 and \$100, respectively, and \$49 costs in a waiver process. He did not, however return the signed guilty plea. Taylor ruled the payment of fines and costs was construed to be a plea of no contest and found him guilty.

Israhel E. Vance waived his right to counsel and pleaded guilty to no proof of financial responsibility, a Class 2 misdemeanor committed Dec.9, 2023. Vance was fined \$100 and \$50 costs. A second charge, operate unregistered vehicle, was

# Winter care for your bulls

While breeding season may be a ways off, making sure our bulls are cared for

throughout the winter and ready to go when it is time to turn out is critical. A sound and fertile bull can mean the difference between success or failure of next year's calf crop. While AI is a valuable tool to use in breeding, across the U.S. 87% of operations still utilize bulls in some capacity.

Winter care for bulls can be broken

down into two categories, body condition and fertility. Let's look at body condition first. Bull condition going into breeding season is a major factor in the success of a bull's breeding capacity. In general, a 1:20 ratio of bull to cows is a good starting point, but depending on pasture size, number of herds, and other factors, that number can vary

during the course of the breeding season. Ben Beckman Getting animals back into condition for next year is one of the primary focuses we should have. Typically we want animals back to a body condition score 6 before turn out next

year. To do this, take a body condition score now if you haven't already done so and develop a plan for feeding. Remember that young animals may not yet be fully grown so will need additional energy and protein to continue growth and build condition. For this reason, depending on the number of bulls in a herd, separating mature and younger animals into separate herds can make meeting feed requirements for each group easier.

Meeting mineral requirements is also important. Re-



search has shown that in particular selenium and zinc are key in maintaining fertility health and sperm production. Iodine in mineral can help with hoof issues and ensure sound feet going into the breeding season.

The second factor to consider with bulls during the winter is fertility. Major impacts on fertility in the winter months are cold and frostbite on the scrotum. Even minor injury can have some impact on fertility, but we really want to protect against major damage that will eventually result in blisters and scabbing. At this point, sperm production will be impacted. Spermatogenesis takes up to 61 days, so damage can have long term impact. Keep an eye out for possible damage when checking bulls and evaluate injured bulls after 45-60 days with a breeding soundness exam. It's better to know early that a bull won't be ready than scrambling for a replacement option last minute.

To keep cold damage to a minimum, do your best to protect animals from the wind and cold. Provide plenty of space for animals to find shelter and windbreaks to cut down on wind-chill impacts. A layer of bedding on the ground helps insulate animals from the cold and protect against freezing.

While bulls may not be our first focus this time of year, don't forget to give their care some thought. Evaluate animal condition and have a plan to get body condition scores back to 6 before next year's breeding season. Providing shelter from the cold with windbreaks and bedding will help safeguard fertility and prevent any unwanted surprises later on.

The Governor also highlighted his recommended adjustments to the biennial state budget as well as his suggestions for spending the remaining unallocated American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) money. Included in his proposal is a \$25 million investment in rural workforce housing, incentives for child care provided by employers, exempting Nebraska National Guard members from income taxes, and transferring \$87 million in unused and reallocated ARPA funds to deal with inflation upping the cost of state highway construction projects. The Governor's budget recommendations would result in a net General Fund increase of \$14.6 million in fiscal year 2023-24 and a net General Fund appropriation reduction of \$34.1 million in fiscal year 2024-25. The ending General Fund balance of \$674.6 million for the 2023-2025 biennium would exceed the minimum three percent General Fund reserve requirement of \$331.6 million.

The first half of the week was spent debating the remainder of the twelve proposals that were advanced from the Rules Committee on a unanimous 5-0 vote. A three-fifths majority, or 30 senators, is required to amend the rules of the Legislature on the floor Several propos als adopted include requiring grammatical and technical changes to a bill be adopted before other amendments can be made during Select File, treating transfers to or from the Cash Reserve Fund the same as an appropriations bill which are held until late in the session before being passed, and increasing the threshold for the number of senators needed to remove a bill from the consent calendar from 3 to 5 members. With the conclusion of rules debate on Friday, senators will spend the next several weeks debating bills and resolutions in the morning and participating in committee hearings in the afternoons. I would encourage people interested in specific bills introduced this year to consider testifying at the Capitol in Lincoln. Comments submitted by 8 AM on the morning of that bill's public hearing can become a part of the record.
