#### **Eleanor Nancy Hecht, 90**

An lowa native, she was a kind soul and made lifelong friends through her volunteer work. An avid reader, she is believed to have read over 5,000 books.



Funeral services for Eleanor Nancy Hecht, age 90, of Tilden, Nebraska were held at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, September 30, 2025, at Our

Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic Church in Tilden. Reverend John Norman was the celebrant, with burial in St. Mary's Catholic Cemetery in Tilden.

Visitation was Monday from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. at Brockhaus-Harlan Funeral Home in Tilden and and continue at the church with a 7:00 p.m. Wake

Nancy died Wednesday, September 24, 2025, at Community Pride Care Center in Battle Creek, Nebraska.

Eleanor Nancy Hecht was born June 16, 1935, in Waterloo, Iowa, to Clarence John and Anne Hudson (Merrifield) Forge. She was the fourth of seven children.

The siblings were very close after experiencing the tragic loss of their mother to cancer when Nancy was ten, and shortly after the loss of their older sister Marian to cancer. The family lived in Des Moines Iowa, and Nancy attended St. John's Catholic School through junior high.

The family moved to Omaha in 1950, and Nancy graduated from Omaha North High School in 1953. While her father wanted her to start working, her stepmother intervened, stating "If the boys can go to college, then Nancy will go to college." Because her younger sister had just joined the convent in Kentucky, it was decided that Nancy would attend Ursuline College in Louisville, Kentucky, to be close to her sister, Louise. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mathematics and came to Tilden High School in the fall of 1957 to teach math and science. There she lived with fellow teacher, Patty Anderson Van Ert, and the two became lifelong friends. They even became linked through family when Patty married Jim Van Ert and Nancy married Frank Hecht, who were cousi

In 1959, Nancy moved to Kansas City to work for AT&T as an engineer's assistant. Frank proposed shortly thereafter, and on June 25, 1960, she married

Frank J. Hecht of Tilden at St. Philip Neri Catholic Church in Omaha. To this union, eight children were born: Lisa, Mark, Paul, Anne, Emily, John, Sarah, and Kathleen. The couple resided southwest of Tilden on the family farm, and Nancy devoted her time as a farmwife and mother. She was involved in Our Lady of Mt Carmel Catholic Church, serving on the Parish Council, Altar Society, and teaching CCD.

She was a kind soul and made lifelong friends through her volunteer work. Nancy was always a champion for the underdog, a great listener, and held a wealth of solid advice. She also taught at Elkhorn Valley Schools in the late 1960s, Orchard Schools in the mid-1960s, and was an aide at District 14, south of Tilden, in the 1990s.

The couple divorced in 1992 but remained friendly. In 1994, Nancy moved to Prescott, Arizona, to live with her sister,

She returned to Norfolk in 1995 to enjoy retirement.

Nancy was an avid reader throughout her entire life; her family estimates that she has read over 5,000 books in her lifetime. In later years, she enjoyed bingo and cards. In February 2014, she entered Prairie View Assisted Living in Tilden.

In 2017, she relocated to the Community Pride Care Center in Battle Creek, where she resided until her death. There, the family, including grandkids, would hold epic Texas Hold 'em tournaments until well past her bedtime. Family gathering was a great joy in her life.

She is survived by her children, Lisa (Paul) Mettler of Chicago, Mark (Mary) Hecht of Tilden, Anne (Jim) Meis of Elgin, Emily (Merle) Borer of Elgin, John (Stacy) Hecht of Roca, and Kathleen (Scott) Margheim of Columbus; 13 grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren and one on the way; one sister-in-law, Delores Forge of Denver; and many nieces and nephews. Nancy was preceded in death

by her parents; stepmother, Elizabeth Nitz Forge; her son, Paul in 2024; her daughter, Sarah in infancy; the father of her children. Frank J. Hecht: brothers, David and Clarence John Jr. "Jack" sisters Mariar Marge, Carol, and Louise; inlaws, Dick and Marian (Hecht) Wisch and Marvin and Agnes (Hecht) Renner; and many other relatives and friends.

Pat grew up on a farm south of Wausa, Nebraska, alongside her brother, Lee Olson. She graduated from Osmond High School in 1969 and went on to attend Bryan College of Nursing in Lincoln, Nebraska, where she earned her degree as a Registered Nurse. On October 14, 1972, Pat was

united in marriage to Dwaine Uttecht. The couple first made their home in Lincoln before moving to Neligh, Nebraska, where they welcomed their son, Christopher Lee Uttecht. During their time in Neligh, Pat began her 25-year career at the Neligh Nursing Center, serving first as Director of Nursing and later as Administrator.

In 1983, Pat, Dwaine, and Chris moved to Elgin, where she lived for the next 25 years. Pat retired from the Neligh Nursing Center in May 2008 and joined Dwaine in Ravenna, Nebraska.

In 2015, Pat and Dwaine made their retirement home in Fremont, Nebraska.



# Next steps to close the digital divide in rural Nebraska

My husband Bruce and I raised our family on a cattle ranch near Valentine, Nebraska – a rural community that understands how spotty Wi-Fi makes it difficult to connect with family and friends. In today's day and age, reliable internet access is no longer optional. But for too many Nebraskans living in rural communities, it's still out of reach.

That reality has shaped my work in

the U.S. Senate, where I chair the Telecommunications and Media Subcommittee on the Commerce Committee. Time and again, I've heard from families, small businesses, and schools across Nebraska who face the same barriers mine does: patchy service, slow speeds, and the feeling of being left

behind in a digital economy. That's why I introduced the Modernization, Accountability, and Planning (MAP) for Broadband Funding Act this past summer. At its core, this bill is about accountability. We already know billions of federal dollars are being spent on broadband expansion. The real question is: are those dollars making a difference for the families who need them most?

The MAP for Broadband Funding Act strengthens oversight of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC)'s Broadband Funding Map — the tool meant to show where the federal government spends money on expanding broadband service.

My bill directs the FCC to review how usable and accurate that map really is for the public and providers, and it tasks the Government Accountability Office with ensuring federal agencies are reporting information correctly. If the map is flawed, then the billions of dollars tied to it risk missing the mark.

This is not my first step in clos ing the digital divide. Back in 2021, I worked with Senator Catherine Cortez Masto (D-Nev.) to push for the creation of this very map the FCC now maintains through an amendment to the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. Its launch in 2023 was progress, but progress without oversight can quickly

That's why I introduced this bill and am pushing for its advancement through committee and onto the Senate floor.

Another cornerstone of my work to close the digital divide – and keep it closed - relates to the Universal Service Fund (USF). For decades, the USF has helped extend and support communications access to rural America. Today, the fund is poised for updates, nearly 30 years after Congress created the universal service mission to connect all Americans through voice and

broadband, no matter where they live. The USF must be predictable, sustainable, and modernized to reflect how people actually communicate in 2025.

That's why I am proud to co-lead a bipartisan, bicameral congressional working group charged with reshaping the USF. Our goal is straightforward: make sure this unique mechanism supports universal service long into the future, in a manner that targets resources and eliminates waste. It's not enough to talk about closing the digital divide — we must prove that

we're truly closing it. For me, this isn't just policy. It's personal. I know what it means to live in a community where reliable internet is a luxury, not a given.

Too often, D.C. bureaucrats decide that rural America is too expensive

and too hard to connect with broadband infrastructure that meets the needs of today - and of tomorrow. And I know the opportunities Nebraskans are missing as a result, from education and telehealth to entrepreneurship and precision agriculture.


geous things. "There's ugly speech. There's gross speech. There's evil speech. And all

of it is protected by the First Amend-Both of the above quotes are attributable to Charlie Kirk, a political activist, media personality and evangelical Christian who was recently murdered,

allegedly by a young man angered by Kirk's views on homosexuality and gender transitions. It was a sickening crime, witnessed by hundreds of students attending a

Kirk event at a Utah college. Such violence is abhorrent, and has no place in American political discourse. (On the same day there was more political violence: a 16-yearold boy opened fire inside a Colorado school - a boy who purportedly

views.) I'll admit, I wasn't familiar with Kirk's political views, or his substantial following among young

I had forgotten that in April of 2024, Kirk had held a political rally in Omaha to put pressure on Nebraska lawmakers to end the state's unique system of awarding presidential electoral college votes, and adopt a winner-takeall system, like most states. (The call came too late in the legislative session that year to do anything about it, and since there, there's been a lack of votes needed to make that change

What's even more sad about the murder of Kirk is that it took someone who advocated for free speech, and who regularly, and admirably, debated those who had differing opinions.

I'm a huge believer in free speech, as a journalist and as an American. Our guarantee of free speech rights puts us apart from many other countries, where dissent is squelched, media outlets shut down and, as in Russia, opposition leaders are jailed and end

Freedom of speech, as well as freedom of the press, keeps our gov-



ernment officials accountable and, in many cases, brings out the truth.

America's founders, in 1791, felt so strongly about ensuring the freedom to express opinions – even those that disparaged or opposed the current government – that they amended the Constitution, adding the Bill of Rights. Those rights include the freedom to worship as we chose – not how the government dictates.

"God hath created the mind free, and manifested his supreme will that free it shall remain by making it altogether insusceptible of restraint," wrote Thomas Jefferson.

Jefferson, then, and U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas now, warned us against allowing the government to decide what is "free speech" and what isn't, because it could come back to bite us. Right now, President Trump can demonize liberals and threaten reprisals, but as soon as a liberal or moderate gains the White House, the tables will turn, and conservatives might lose jobs or be the targets of threats.

Right now, the government is trying nunish people for what they say

Talk show host Jimmy Kimmel makes a joke - which is what comedians do – and suddenly the head of a government agency, the Federal Communications Commission (which licenses broadcasters) is calling for his firing. Kimmel eventually got his job back, but the message was clear – if you say something we don't like, look

Across the country, people were losing their jobs or being forced to resign over their comments – however appropriate or inappropriate – over the killing of Charlie Kirk.

We saw that even in Nebraska. A school board member in Kimball stepped down for posting on social media that he didn't think American flags should be lowered to half staff after the murder of Kirk. (Gotta say, I've heard several similar grines in the nast from the left and right, about why the flag was lowered for certain reasons.)

And then there's the lawsuits the president has filed against nearly every news network and major newspaper in the country over stories, or editing decisions, he didn't like. Again, better watch what you write or say, regardless of the Bill of Rights.

The bottom line here is that freedom of speech is a precious right in our country.

To let it erode is a tragedy. That's something even Charlie Kirk would



# District court held last week

Several defendants who approbable-cause affidavit. peared in Antelope County District Court on Sept. 24 received continuances.

Hunter E. Ashburn Taylor of Tilden received a continuance in a case where he faces one count of use of firearm to commit a felony, a Class I felony: and one count of terroristic threats, a Class IIIA felony.

Represented by defense counsel Nathan Stratton, Ashburn Taylor made the request to the Honorable James G. Kube. Antelope County Attorney Joe Smith did not object to the motion.

Kube set a pretrial conference for Oct. 29 and continued a jury trial to Dec. 9. Bond, set at \$50,000-10%, with conditions previously ordered, remains in

Antwan J. Deleon, of Neligh, will appear again for a pretrial conference on Oct. 29. His attorney, Nate Stratton, made the request to Kube, who advised Deleon of his right to a speedy trial. Deleon waived that right.

Smith filed a motion to endorse, and Stratton had no objections.

A jury trial in the case is scheduled for Dec. 9. Bond, set at \$25,000-10%, remains in effect.

Deleon faces on count of unauthorized use of a financial transaction device/\$5,000+, a Class IIA felony; and one count of theft by deception \$5,000. Deleon, who worked in the accounting department at Reinke's Farm and City Service, in Neligh, is alleged to have used a company credit card for approximately \$10,000 in non-approved charges and charges not customary to the business, according to the probable cause affidavit.

# Fall Armyworm

This year, fall armyworms are working their way north across Nebraska at higher than usual levels, and that's raising questions about how to manage them.

The fall armyworm doesn't overwinter here — moths migrate up from the south each summer. By late August and September, populations can build quickly. In alfalfa, pasture, and forage systems, the highest risk is in new seedings or tender regrowth, with infestations often starting along field edges or adjacent

Rapid browning in pastures, alfalfa, small grains, or even lawns that seems to appear almost overnight can be a telltale sign. Larvae feed mostly at night or early morning, then hide at the soil surface during the day. Check the transition zone between green and brown areas, or use a sweep net to confirm presence. When scouting, look for a distinct upside-down

"Y" on the head, stripes running the length of the body, and four black spots in a square pattern on the last segment. Adults are gray-brown moths with a wingspan of about an inch and a half, showing lighter and darker streaks across the wings.

Current weather is playing a role in armyworm presence too. Warm days and mild nights are keeping larvae active longer and slowing down their migration south. That means scouting now is especially important, since pressure could linger later into the fall than normal.

Thresholds for treatment vary by crop. In new alfalfa larvae per square foot can cause major loss. In established stands, ten to fifteen larvae per square foot can strip a field quickly. In pastures and hayfields, a working threshold of three or more larvae per square foot is a good rule of thumb. Caterpillars less than three-quarters of an inch long

are the easiest to control. Larger ones are much harder to kill and may already have done most of the damage, so treatment timing is critical.

Control options

include several common insecticides, with some products allowing zero-day grazing restrictions. Check the label for your specific circumstance and make sure restrictions match. For organic systems, spinosad or Bt products work best on small larvae.

If you've already lost a stand, scout for regrowth. Healthy crowns may bounce back if larvae are controlled quickly, but reseeding alfalfa this late isn't advised. Waiting until spring is usually the better option. For cover crops lost to feeding, small grains like rye, wheat, or triticale are the only real options for reseeding this late in the year.

For those planning fall small grain or cover crop planting, delaying seeding until early October may help avoid pressure, but if you seed earlier, be prepared to scout and protect young seedlings. Lawns can also be hit hard. Products with Bt or Sevin are options, but remember to water them in so granules reach the soil line. Attacked fescue lawns may need reseeding, while mixed or full bluegrass stands usually fill back in.

The takeaway is simple: scouting is critical. Fall armyworm outbreaks can strip a stand within just a few days. Early detection and treatment, timed while larvae are still forage, cover crops, and lawns this fall.

# Signs of childhood **bullying**

Bullying is a considerable problem that currently affects many students. The National Center for Education Statistics notes one of every five students reported being bullied in 2022. In a multi-national study across 83 countries, 30.5 percent of adolescents reported being bullied, according to eClinical Medicine.

Parents and caregivers can be diligent in recognizing bullying in an effort to protect children. Here are 10 signs a child may be a victim

- of bullying.



EPPJ failed to get a first down on the ensuing possession and was forced to punt again. On Creighton's first play, Ethan Kuhl was pressured by Trey Rittscher and Justice Blecher. His wobbly pass was picked off by Pelster who raced 54 yards down the sideline for EPPJ's final touchdown.
