City to seek bids on water meter project

Meeting Monday night, the Elgin City Council put in motion a plan which will, likely by the end of 2023, have new water meters installed across the community.

The council, at the behest of City Engineer John Zwingman, voted 3-0 (Craig Niewohner was absent) to go forward with the advertising for bids for more than 400 new water meters to be purchased, installed and be fully functional.

Zwingman estimated the project, from start to completion, would cost approximately \$300,000. Depending on each property, some meters will need to be installed inside, others will be put into a pit. Also, the meters will vary in size.

The project will now be advertised for bids. The council set the date of March ${\bf 2}$ at 2 p.m. for the bid letting. In other action:

Presentation — Steven Melnick gave a short presentation on a voluntary benefit package for employees available through Colonial Life. He left information to be reviewed and discussed at a later meeting should there be interest.

Water problem — Judith Orlowski spoke near the start of the meeting regarding a water pipe issue at the cottage at 401 Plantation Street. She said the problem which occurred just before Christmas has resulted in the need to use electric heat to control the problem until such time as the shutoff can be found this spring. To that end, the council agreed to pay the bill submitted, \$65.85.

Proclamation — With March being Problem Gambling Awareness Month, a proclamation was read noting how the problem exists all over, urging citizens to learn more about the consequences


of compulsive gambling and seek assistance through the Nebraska Gamblers Assistance Program.

Resolution — The council passed a resolution to authorize the city clerk to

allow for payments to be made outside of meetings when necessary. The bills would still be reviewed by the council at their monthly meeting.



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

Clearwater man accused in two assault cases

Court reporter A second felony sexual assault complaint has been filed by Deputy Antelope County Attorney Joe Smith against a Clearwater man.

Michael J. Mueller, 26, of Clearwater appeared in front of the Honorable Donna Taylor in the Neligh courtroom Wednesday, Feb. 1 for a preliminary hearing on first-degree sexual assault, a Class 2 felony alleged Christmas night. An oral motion to continue by Mueller's attorney, Martin Klein of Neligh, was granted by Taylor.

Mueller also faced the judge for arraignment on another count of first-degree sexual assault, alleged "on or between March 1, 2022, and Dec. 27,

Preliminary hearings in both cases are now set Feb. 15. Bond, in amounts of \$250,000 and \$100,000, posted Jan. 4 and Jan 24, respectively, are continued as well, including conditions for no contact, directly nor indirectly, with any person under 18 years of age.

and operational data. The deadline for receiving this information is February 24, 2023. The NDOT will host a virtual RFI meeting on February 13, 2023. Visit the NDOT NEVI website for details for connecting to the meeting.

Funds for the NEVI program will come from the 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), providing states with nearly \$7.5 billion to expand the Electric Vehicle (EV) charging network. This funding supports the administration's goal of expanding EV charging stations along designated Alternative Fuel Corridors (AFCs) and other corridors that could be identified in the state.

Nebraska's portion of the funding is approximately \$6 million per year for the next five years. The first-year focus will be on developing electric charging infrastructure on AFCs, which includes Interstate 80 across the state, as well as Nebraska Highway 31 and U.S. Highway 6 in the Omaha area. NDOT is committed to supporting up to 80%of project capital costs, with program applicants expected to furnish the remaining 20%.

Key goals of the program are completing construction of DC Fast Charger (DCFC) sites along the designated Alternate Fuel Corridors (AFCs) in Nebraska, followed by construction of sites in other locations; providing reliable, accessible charging facilities to travelers in Nebraska; and addressing environmental and social justice goals relating to access and location of charging facilities.

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Entering the 118th Congress, fresh opportunities await lawmakers

It is an honor to serve the great state of Nebraska and all of you who live here. I am committed to using all these committee assignments to continue delivering for Nebraskans every single day.


Things not as they seem at the legislature

Many people touted this year's legislative session as a Republican dominated conservative body that could easily work with the Republican administration to get things done.

They reasoned that 32 Republicans in the officially nonpartisan body would win out over the 17 Democrats. They tried valiantly to get 33 Republicans elected, a so-called "magic" number that could withstand filibusters by the dissenters and pave the way for a conservative agenda.

Observers sighed relief when the number fell short because it would guarantee some spirited

debate and prevent a runaway train where the new governor would have cooperation unseen since the (former Gov. Dave) Heine-

It didn't take many days for the minority to prove feisty in the technical aspects of the nation's only one-house nonpartisan legislature. Things like legislative rules and bill referencing, usually the stuff which reporters, legislative staff and lobbyists care about, suddenly became important to the average Nebraskan.

The Rules Committee dealt with 58 proposed changes to the permanent rules, which must be

adopted every two years. That brought more than 100 testifiers to a marathon nine-hour committee hearing. Several people said it was unprecedented. But, when the smoke cleared, the Legislature only adopted eight changes and avoided the con troversial issues, perhaps until later in the 90-day session which ends in June.

Lincoln Sen. Danielle Conrad, a Democrat who completed her four-year stint away from the Legislature after being term-limited, said it was part of the "compromise, consensus and common ground" Nebraskans expect their lawmakers to find at the Capitol.

But that congeniality faded a few days later when a controversial anti-abortion bill (LB626) was sent to the Republican-dominated Health and Human Services Committee instead of the Judiciary Committee, which is chaired by a Democrat.

Conrad used strong words arguing that the Legislature's referencing guide says abortion goes to Judiciary, where those bills are traditionally sent. "We're seeing a continual tyranny of the majority," she said. "We're bending the rules we're fast tracking and diverting the process to ensure a desired result.'

Supporters of the bill said it was referenced to the Health and Human Services Committee on a 9-to-0 vote by the Legislature's Executive Committee because it's not like other abortion bans since there is no criminal penalty or liability in the bill," chief sponsor Sen. Joni Albrecht of Thurston


Sen. Julie Slama of Dunbar said the Health and Human Services Committee has heard abortion bills in the past. "Abortion isn't a magical word that magically gets a bill sent to the Judiciary Committee.'

So, lest the Republicans in general and the conservatives in specific try to take all the credit for being the anti-abortion folks, allow me some perspective.

In the early years of anti-abortion debates in Lincoln, the first bills were sponsored by Sen. Cap Dierks of Ewing and Omaha Sens. Bernice Labedz, John Lindsay and Tim Hall. All four were Democrats. Even former Democrat Gov. Ben Nelson signed one or two bills into law.

So, stop the gloating.

But, back to the rules. A proposal signed by more than two dozen senators to change the selection of committee chairs from a secret ballot to a



recorded vote did not advance to the floor. Neither did a proposal to close committee executive sessions to members of the media, who have been able to cover the discussions of senators behind closed doors for nearly 90 years.

Sen. Steve Erdman of Bayard, the chair of the Rules Committee, said those measures may be brought back for consideration later in the session.

That debate could bring the session to a bitter and contentious end. Let's hope lawmakers get some important work done before then. There's plenty of it to discuss.

Empowering families across the nation

Students are a large part of why I'm so optimistic about the future of our great country. In recent years they've faced unprecedented challenges as COVID-19 disrupted traditional classroom settings. While Nebraskans worked hard to keep our schools open, other

states can't say the same. The resulting spotlight on public schools highlighted just how important parental engagement and freedom is to student success. Parents. not politicians, know what their children need in the classroom. This isn't to say private education is always superior - I proudly attended Nebraska's excellent public schools - but no child should be stuck in a failing system because of their ZIP code or socioeconomic status.

This week I spoke with students at a rally celebrating National School Choice Week organized by Senator Tim Scott. I was encouraged by the hope and potential in the

students who attended the event, many of whom benefitted when their parents were empowered to choose the school best for their children. We can - and should - come together around a number of commonsense, creative policy ideas without

costly prohibitions and mandates, and without the heavy hand of the federal government.

To seize one such opportunity, I recently introduced, alongside Rep. Burgess Owens of Utah and Sen. Bill Cassidy of Louisiana, the Educational Choice for Children Act (ECCA).

This bill would establish a tax incentive for individuals and businesses to fund scholarship awards for students to cover expenses related to K-12 public and private education without dropping onerous mandates on states, localities, and school districts. This bill was a priority for my late colleague, Rep. Jackie Walorski, and I'm honored to continue her work on this important issue.

From rural and urban to public and private, this legislation would complement existing school choice offerings in states. The ECCA holds great benefit and options for communities as part of an all-of-the-above approach to improving education

An estimated two million students in any elementary or secondary education setting, including homeschool, are eligible to receive a scholarship through provisions in this bill to cover costs related to tuition, fees, book supplies, and equipment for the enrollment or attendance at an elementary or secondary school.

The bill also allows scholarships to cover tutoring costs and other ancillary expenses for students in rural areas where school districts may not have the capacity to address every student's needs.

Hearings set for priority bills

This week saw the Legislature begin the first of two weeks of all-day committee hearings. Traditionally, senators would meet as a body in the morning and split into different committees in the afternoons. However, Speaker Arch wanted to try to front-load the session with hearings so there will be more time for debate later in the session. Therefore, senators will not have an opportunity for floor debate until the week of Febru-

Two of my bills were scheduled for a public hearing later this month. LB 453 would allow the Nebraska Department of Transportation (NDOT) to change how the administrative costs of the Division of Aeronautics are paid out to free up about \$2 million for grants to small airports, change the required county contribution for bridge replacement from 50 percent to "up to 20 percent" to give NDOT flexibility in assisting smaller counties with bridge repairs, and raise the threshold amount for road construction contracts to encourage

smaller companies to bid on projects without **LEGISLATIVE** needing to go through the burdensome formal bidding process. LB 454 would begin the process of finpansion of U.S. 81 to a 4-lane highway in the state, including between Norfolk and Yankton. Both bills are scheduled for a hearing on Tuesday, February 28 before the Transporta-

tion and Telecommunications Com-

mittee. The Judiciary Committee, on which I serve, heard two proposals this week to try and address Nebraska's prison overcrowding situation. Last year's prison reform bill, LB 920 by former Senator Lathrop, fell to a filibuster and died at the end of the session. This year, Senator Geist introduced LB 50 which would implement the consensus items brought forward by the Nebraska Criminal Justice Reinvestment (CJI) Working Group last session and generally agreed upon in LB 920. Meanwhile, Senator Wayne introduced LB 352 which includes several non-consensus items from the CJI Working Group that were a source of disagreement in last year's debate. The Committee will now have the task of negotiating over both proposals in the weeks ahead.

Senator Albrecht introduced LB 626 before the Health and Human Services Committee. Current Nebraska law prohibits abortions at 20 weeks post-fertilization. Under LB 626, abortions would be restricted once a fetal heartbeat is detected, usually around six weeks gestation.

Again, parents, not politicians, know their children best. This legislation would ensure parents and students, not the government, have the power and resources to decide their education futures.

To further expand educa-

tion opportunities for families, we must also enhance options like 529 investment accounts, education savings accounts, which can be used to pay for certain costs of education programs including college, K-12, and apprenticeships. In 2017, the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act provided for the use of 529 accounts to pay up to \$10,000 per year in private K-12 tuition, however this cap was not indexed for inflation. Doing so would simplify tax compliance for families where grandparents and other family members contribute to 529 accounts.

Advancing these proposals are important steps to renewing our commitment to parental empowerment and education freedom.

This National School Choice Week is a time to remember each student has an important role to play in our community and our country, and each student should have the opportunity to succeed.

Educational opportunity and parental choice are key in encouraging development in areas of learning loss, special needs services, and career and technical education. It can be easy to get discouraged about the state of our politics, but I think of our young people today, and see the future is bright.

Court reporter Ron Crumly, 74, Page, appeared in front of the Honorable Donna Taylor in the Antelope County courtroom in Neligh on Feb. 1, for arraignment on Class 4 misdemeanor alleged March 1, 2022, violation of statewide burn ban. Crumly waived his right to counsel and pleaded guilty. Taylor set sentencing for

March 1. Sarah J. Ward, 46, of Oakdale faced Taylor on Class 4 felony, possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine) alleged Jan. 4. Ward requested court-appointed counsel. Taylor appointed Antelope County Public Defender Pat Carney and set further arraignment for Feb. 15

Bond, in the amount of \$20,000, 10% cash, posted Jan

10. is continued. Austin R. Bertschinger, 30, of Oakdale faced Taylor for further arraignment on a count of possession of tramadol, a Class 4 felony alleged Dec. 10. Taylor continued the case to Feb. 15. Bond posted Dec. 28, in the amount of \$1,000, 10% cash, is continued as well. He is represented by Carney.

Bertschinger was arrested Dec. 10 by an Antelope County deputy, on the Madison-Antelope county line near Tilden, after a bottle of Tramadol was allegedly found in the purse of a passenger during a search of his vehicle.

Michael Hansen, 36, of Stanton appeared for arraignment on a charge of obstructing government operations, a Class 1 misdemeanor alleged Nov. 26. Hansen, who is represented by Frederick Bartell of Norfolk, pleaded not guilty. Pretrial hearing is set Feb. 15.

Christopher B. Brady, 22, of Elgin appeared on allegations he violated probation. He requested court-appointed counsel. Taylor appointed Carney and reviewed Brady's bond conditions and probation order. Further arraignment is set Feb. 15, with bond posted Jan. 27, in the amount of

\$4,000, 10%, continued. Brady was placed on probation by Taylor on Nov. 2, 2022, until May 2, 2024, for a conviction of third-degree domestic assault.

The alleged violations include use of alcohol and drugs, failing to download continuous alcohol monitor readings. failure to appear for alcohol/ drug testing and failing to complete an evaluation as ordered by the court.

Breanna McNutt, 23, of Norfolk did not appear for a violation of probation hearing. Bartell faced Taylor on her behalf and requested continuance. Taylor continued the hearing to March 1.

McNutt was sentenced to an eight-month term of probation April 6, 2022, for her conviction of third-degree assault and criminal mischief. The violation charge stems from an alleged positive drug test (methamphetamine and amphetamine) on Nov. 9, 2022.

Ray M. Connot, 57, of Neligh did not appear for a pretrial hearing on a Class 3 misdemeanor, second-degree criminal trespass, alleged Oct. 27. The hearing was continued to Feb. 15 on a motion of Deputy **Antelope County Attorney** Joseph Smith.

A motion filed by Bradley Easland of Norfolk, on behalf of his client, Lynn D. Koinzan, 63, of Elgin, was granted. Koinzan's pretrial hearing on a charge of reckless driving, alleged Aug. 30, 2022, is continued to Feb. 15.

An affidavit and motion requesting a warrant for the arrest of Tricia A. Zobrist, 43, of Oakdale, was filed by Smith. Zobrist failed to appear in Antelope County Court Jan. 18 on a charge of issuing a bad check and Taylor ruled Smith could file the appropriate documents for the defendant's arrest. The warrant was signed Feb. 2 by the Honorable Ross Stoffer, set-

ting bond at \$1,500, 10%. Zobrist allegedly wrote a check to Thriftway Market in Neligh in December 2021, which failed to clear the bank. According to the affidavit, the

county attorney's office has three additional bad checks allegedly written by Zobrist, to Mr. S's in Oakdale.

Morgan K. Anson, 24, Orchard waived her right to a preliminary hearing when she appeared in front of the Honorable Donna Taylor in the Antelope County courtroom in Neligh last week.

Anson is charged with a Class 2A felony, theft by receiving stolen property and three Class 4 felonies, possession of methamphetamine, operating a motor vehicle to avoid arrest and possession of burglar

tools, all alleged Dec. 9. Taylor bound the case over to the Antelope County district court, where arraignment is set Feb. 22.

The judge further ordered that bond posted Dec. 20, 2022, in the amount of \$50,000, 10% cash, be reinstated Feb. 3, conditioned on the defendant going directly from the Antelope County Jail to a treatment facility, with no other stops. If

treatment is terminated or the defendant leaves treatment unsuccessfully, she is to return immediately to the jail.

Bond was revoked Jan. 18, after Anson allegedly tested positive for meth on several occasions, according to a motion filed by Deputy Antelope County Attorney Joe Smith. Anson is represented by Antelope County Public Defender Pat Carney.

She was remanded to the custody of Antelope County Sheriff Robert Moore.

Michael D. Fox, 37, of Orchard appeared, alongside Carney, for first hearing on a felony count of terroristic threats, a Class 3A felony alleged Jan. 30. Fox requested a preliminary hearing, which Taylor set for Feb. 15. If convicted of the Class 3A felony, Fox faces up to three years in prison and/or up to a \$10,000 fine. Bond is continued at \$100,000, 10%.

Fox was remanded back to Moore's custody, pending posting of bond.

This bill includes exceptions for the health and life of the mother or in cases of sexual assault, incest, or medical emergency. An unlawful abortion by a physician in violation of LB626 would constitute unprofessional conduct and could result in their medical license being revoked.

The Revenue Committee heard several bills that comprise parts of the Governor's tax reform package. Senator

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Linehan, chair of the Committee, presented LB 754 at the governor's request that would gradually reduce the state's top-tier individual income tax rate from 6.27% to 3.99% with the lower corporate rate targeted at earnings exceeding \$100,000. This proposal would move Nebraska into the top 15 states in terms of the lowest individual and corporate income tax rates. Two other bills heard by the committee, LB 804 and LB 806 by Senator von Gillern at the request of the Governor, would accelerate the personal income tax cuts and corporate income tax cuts that were enacted by the Legislature in 2022.

In the Government and Military Affairs Committee, Senator Slama presented the first major proposal to try and reshape Nebraska elections. Her bill, LB 535, would create a framework to implement voter ID following last year's successful ballot initiative. This proposal would require the inclusion of the identification number of the voter's valid photographic identification issued by the State of Nebraska or, if none, a photocopy of any other valid photographic iden tification issued to the voter when a request for a ballot is made to the election commissioner or county clerk. Senator Slama also brought forward an amendment that would require persons wishing to vote by mail to get their ballot notarized before turning them in. Following the hearing, Senator Brewer, who chairs the committee, indicated the bill would need to go through a lot of changes before it would
